KEYSTONE AWARD

Doug Wentzel Shaver's Creek Environmental Center

Doug Wentzel is a program director, instructor and naturalist at Shaver's Creek Environmental Center in central PA. For 30 years he has directed the education internship and numerous birding programs including helping to create The Birding Cup annual fundraiser. OUTSTANDING ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION PROGRAM AWARD

The Floating Classroom Science Program Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy, Ryan Beltz



The mission of the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy is to protect the land and water resources of the local watershed as well as serve the community of people within it. The Floating Classroom is a state of the art research and educational vessel providing immersive STEM experiences for students of all ages. The specially equipped pontoon boat is powered by its unique solar array and electric motor. It is fully out-fitted with stereomicroscopes, aquarium, wifi, water sampling equipment, sonar, and iPads to facilitate experiential learning and interaction with the local watershed. Students are introduced to a myriad of topics as this one-of-a-kind Floating Classroom connects students to their local watershed in a unique way and challenges them to think about the importance of viable freshwater ecosystems globally.

Ryan Beltz

Prior to his tenure with the Conservancy, Ryan worked as a land manager at Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, as an instructor of English at Alvernia University, as a ranger with the US Fish and Wildlife Service in Alaska and as a canoe guide on the Inside Passage. He holds two degrees in English.

We do not use single-use plastics, offering paper straws and corn starch-based stirrers; we compost all spent grains from our brewery and our kitchen and post-consumer food scraps at a commercial composting facility; we offer sustainably-raised shrimp in our entrees; we use high post-consumer recycled content paper products in our restrooms; we have LED fixtures and programmable thermostats throughout the building. We are Gold-level certified by Sustainable Pittsburgh for our efforts. In addition, we participate in PennDOT's Adopt-A-Highway program for a three-mile long section of our road, which borders Little Pine Creek, hosting regular cleanups followed by free lunch and beverages at our brewery.
